Guest Speaker

- Stuart Servetar, former MS54 parent, founder of iBid Prep, a well-known UWS tutoring service, and SHSAT expert spoke to eighth grade students and teachers about the SHSAT and how best to prepare.
- Bio: After working for decades as a private tutor, Stuart Servetar formed ibidPREP in 2006. Stuart has published seven textbooks in the *Remain Clam!* series and helped thousands of students through the middle, high school and college entry process.

Key points

- 9 specialized high schools (incl. Laguardia which doesn't take the test)
- You can prep yourself (DOE makes available a handbook with 2 practice tests), courses or 1:1. Take the baseline for free and put together a plan. Traditionally prep starts after the State tests in the Spring. Some prep over the summer. Fall is late.
 - If you want to take the test from Stuart's company email <u>info@ibidprep.com</u>.
 Mention the PTA meeting for a discount. His baseline is meant for 7th graders to get a ROUGH idea where you are.
 - Visit the IBID website Spring classes start in April/May
- Different mentality on scores than other tests Don't need to "master" the test, just need to maximize your score. High 80% is good! You can still get into the specialized schools with a grade 72-86% Stuy average was 86% in 2019. It is graded on a curve!
- 3 hour test. Practice and prep in advance. It is free and nothing happens to you if you don't do well. Test doesn't need to be done in order you can self-direct. It is advised you start with the sections you are strongest. You don't get points for finishing, you ONLY get points for questions you get CORRECT. There is no guessing penalty -- try to get as many of the ones you can right but don't leave anything blank. More time permitted if you have IEP accommodations. No second chances on the test (it's one time!).
- Might not be for everyone. It is a chance to control the process. Take a practice test to see how far away you are from a good score. If it is within reach, it is worth the shot
- Test is organized into 2 sections (57 questions each).
 - Verbal: Revising and editing (aka grammar!); punctuation; Majority is reading comprehension. Requires more analysis and details. Non fiction with data, fiction, and poetry
 - Math: Arithmetic; <u>NO calculator allowed on the test!</u> Need to do long division (into decimals); Fractions; Algebra; and Geometry
